If you have a boat, you should have insurance, protection in case the boat is stolen, vandalized, involved in an accident or catches fire. Nature may cause damage by winds or waves. (No, I am not in the insurance business).

CPS can help you to obtain favourable rates with qualified, reputable insurers. Even if you don't insure through a CPS-recommended company, there may still be advantages to be had because of your CPS connection. My own boat is a small one and it is insured with the same company that insures my home. When the

renewal premium notice came, my rate had gone up a few percent (due to the increased cost of doing business these days).I called the insurance company to see if my connection with CPS entitled me to a discount. They asked if I had taken any safety courses and since I had, they asked for a copy of my certificate. (If you have lost your certificate, let us know and we will re-issue it).

The result was a fifteen percent discount, a savings of over \$60, about double my annual membership fee in CPS. That in itself is enough reason to remain a member in our squadron. Of course, there are many other reasons to be a member, but let us look into those in a future issue of View From the Helm.

We look forward to great year with all of you of Ashbridge's Bay Squadron.
